Christmas: A Season of Hope. THIS WEDNESDAY, December 17th, at 5:30 pm, we will hold a service with Holy Eucharist in the church, acknowledging that, for some, the Christmas season can be filled with grief, anger, hopelessness, and challenge. Our service, called *Christmas: A Season of Hope*,

will leave space for lament and grief while also paying homage to the promise and hope that is Christ's coming into the world. There will be a simple reception afterwards in the parish hall with cookies, coffee, and cider and just maybe a fire in the fireplace.

Advent Bible study: Join us on Sundays of Advent at 12:30 pm on Zoom, for a special Bible Study of Advent. Using a theme of our Advent wreath candles – and their colors – to frame a special Bible study using verses from scripture that foretell the coming of the



Messiah, from the prophets, the psalms, and the Gospel witness itself. Please plan to join us via Zoom, if you can!! Note that on December 21st the Study will begin at 1 p.m. due to our *Greening of the Church*. A wonderful way to connect to the themes of the Advent season, as we wait expectantly the coming of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Sundays of Advent: *O little town of Bethlehem:* We love singing the hymns and carols that frame our brief, beautiful season of Christmastide! I so look forward to singing *Hark! The herald angels sing, Silent Night, It came upon a midnight clear,* and so many other wonderful hymns that express the joy of Christ's nativity and what that birth means for the world. But have you ever really explored the words of some of our great hymns of Christmas or Advent? For the next 2 Sundays of Advent, we will dive a little

We are looking for volunteers to help hang greens, wreaths and decorate the windows, all while enjoying fellowship and creating a glorious welcome for the Christmas season. If you are going to join us, please bring some clippers for trimming greens. We are also in need of fresh greens for the windowsills. If you are willing to donate them, please leave them by the sidewalk to the right of the church's front entrance. We are doing both indoor and outdoor *Greening* so dress accordingly. There are two bins in the narthex: a blue one for the community food pantries and a darker bin for St Mark's Pantry. There are some items that are most needed by all the food pantries:

- · Canned proteins tuna, chicken, stews, beans, soup, chili, and other canned meats
- Canned fruit and vegetables
- · Pasta, sauces, Mac and cheese
- · Cereal, crackers, oatmeal, snacks
- Flour, sugar, mixes, condiments, coffee, tea
- Low sodium foods
- Peanut butter and jelly
- Toilet paper, laundry detergent

Please take time to worship this Christmas:

Christmas Eve at 4:00 p.m. Christmas Story presented by a multi-generational cast of folks with holy Eucharistic to follow.

Christmas Eve at 10:30 p.m. for a festal Eucharist with choir and instrumentalists, preceded by music at 10 p.m.

Christmas Day at 11:00 a.m. A simple service of Holy Eucharist with hymns.

Hearing assist support upgrade: We have an upgrade to our sanctuary audio system which should clear up volume issues some have experienced on the livestream and in the worship space itself. Please let us know if those issues are unresolved for you at home. There is a discreetly placed Wi-Fi station that should help folks with hearing impairments. We have four devices which can be found on the table in the narthex (ask ushers for help, if needed). The process is simple and below; if you have an iPhone or Android, you can use your phone:

- + Get one of our hearing aid devices
- + Log into to St. James Par (our Wi-Fi network) with password St Jofc 2010
- + Go to the App Store and download Wavecast audio receiver (Williams).
- + Once you have the app, open it, and click on Search by channel or name
- + Adjust the volume on the hearing aid device (each device comes with simple instructions).
