

A Stewardship Reflection for the week of November 16th

We are the clay; you are the potter; we are all the work of your hand. (Isaiah 64:8)

Most of us know the basic story of Job, one of the great pieces of wisdom literature from the Old Testament. Job's children and grandchildren die in a freak storm, he loses his livestock and pretty much everything else. On top of that, he is afflicted with sores and illness. He refuses to curse God but, near the end of the book that bears his name, Job demands that God tell him why all this has happened to him? Why has God brought this calamity upon his head and made his life a wasteland, Job asks.

God answered Job ... I have some questions for you ... Where were you when I created the earth? Tell me, since you know so much! Who decided on its size? Certainly, you'll know that! Who came up with the blueprints and measurements? The Message, Job 38:4-7

God said to Jeremiah, at the very beginning of the great prophet's call to ministry, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born, I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations" (Chapter 1, v. 5). God knows us, because he made us. God made us because He loves us. We sometimes forget that the God of all creation, the One who set the foundations of the earth – made all things in heaven, on earth, and beyond this earth, too – holds all in His creative, powerful hands. It is understandable to become frustrated, even furious with God when things go wrong in our lives, because we believe He has the ability set things right, if He chooses. Yet "your thoughts are not my thoughts, and your ways are not my ways, says the Lord" (Isaiah 55:8). God is not subject to the whimsy of our wants and needs. He is not subject to our commands and yet, He loves us and desires what is best for us. The surest pathway to healing, in our lives and spirits, is to see God as the One thing we can always rely on, our constant friend and companion, the maker of heaven and earth. Healing is in Christ, God's co-creative force and His singular instrument telling us just how much He loves us.

Sound Healing returning! NEXT SATURDAY, November 22nd, at 9 am (light breakfast provided, come early), we welcome back Kelvin Young, RSS, a certified Sound Healer and Owner of Kelvin Young, LLC. Kelvin will tell us about his incredible journey and lead us through a sound healing session as a way of experiencing a new

way of healing and meditation. During the session, Kelvin will play the crystal and Tibetan singing bowls, gong, ocean drum, chimes, and other healing instruments (tools) to activate the relaxation response to calm your mind, relax your body, feel your emotions, and nourish your soul.

Thanksgiving worship will be celebrated with Holy Eucharist on Thanksgiving morning, Thursday, November 27th at 10 am. First Communion: On Saturday, December 13th at 3 pm, we will offer a short class on First Communion. Usually, it is best if a child is four or older, and we will spend some time handling the objects we use during Communion (the cup, the paten, the bread, etc.) and talking about why

we use them, why Communion is such an important part of our common lives in church, etc. We have booklets for them, too. Please let Fr. George know if your child is interested in participating, even if they have already begun receiving the Eucharist.

Handbell Choir: Playing handbells is an act of praise and the joy brought in the hearing connects us more closely to God and our faith. Hearing assist support upgrade: We have an upgrade to our sanctuary audio system which should clear up volume issues some have experienced on the livestream and in the worship space itself. Please let us know if those issues are unresolved for you at home. There is a discreetly placed Wifi station that should help folks with hearing impairments. We have four devices which can be found on the table in the narthex (ask ushers for help, if needed). The process is simple and below; if you have an iPhone or Android, you can use your phone:

- + Get one of our hearing aid devices
- + Log into to St. James Par (our Wi-Fi network) with password StJofc2010
- + Go to the App Store and download Wavecast audio receiver (Williams).
- + Once you have the app, open it, and click on Search by channel or name
- + Adjust the volume on the hearing aid device (each device comes with simple instructions).

Outreach Corner

Food Collection

Thank you to all of the parishioners of St James for your outpouring of support and donations of food and other items for our local food banks!! The need has never been greater! The food banks are overwhelmed with people needing food, so we will continue our collection for the foreseeable future. As you know, the collection bins remain in the Narthex of the Church. The bin marked "Farmington Food Pantry" is for food items, and will promptly be delivered to the Farmington Food Pantry as well as the food pantry at Gifts of Love. The other bin is for St. Mark's Ministries , and collects personal care items as well as food items. Additionally, there are white bags in the Narthex and at the top of the stairs outside the Sanctuary marked "Meals for Neighbors" which goes to that food pantry in Bristol. In that same area, we continue to collect peanut butter and jelly for Gifts of Love's "Weekend Backpack Program".

Thanksgiving Baskets

St James will again provide complete Thanksgiving meals for 10 families. Next Sunday (the 23rd) we will gather in the kitchen between the service and put the bags together. Thank you to Kim and Dave Faubert who coordinate this and deliver the bags to Farmington Social Services. There is a signup in the Narthex for the remaining items needed as well as an area to signup to help put the bags together. A bin for the donations is under the signup poster (The Narthex is getting crowded with St James' generosity!) Nonperishable items can go into the bin, and frozen items should be brought to the church next Sunday.
