# A Stewardship Reflection for the week of November 9th

I raised you up for this very purpose, that I might display my power in you ...

Romans 9:17

What is our purpose? Why are we here? There is that age-old debate between science and faith that says science shows us how, perhaps, but it really cannot tell us why we are here; what's it all for? Paul says, in his letter to the Church in Rome, that God "raised you up for this very purpose ..." What purpose? Paul makes a compelling case that we are here to receive God's mercy, to be vessels of God's mercy: that is our purpose. We are here to be vessels of God's grace, to acknowledge and grow in the riches of God's love and to worship the one who is "the cornerstone" (Romans 9:33) of our lives and faith, Jesus Christ.

God gives us His mercy and grace freely, knowing we could never give Him anything of equal value in return, nothing that would reciprocate the world that God has granted us in Jesus. Our purpose is to live lives that give glory to God, pointing toward the one truth: God loved us so much as to die for us. "What," Jesus once asked, "Can you [we] give in return for your [our] life?" We give Jesus our obedience, we give our hope, love, talents, and our lives to God because He gave all for us.

You may remember a movie called *Chariots of Fire* (remember that music?) that won the Academy Award for Best Picture in 1981. The film told the story of two British runners in the lead up to the 1924 Olympic Games in Paris. Eric Liddell was easily the fastest sprinter in the world at the time. He was also a committed Christian and believed that the Lord's Sabbath, Sunday, was for praising God alone. He was set to run in the 100 meter dash and the 200 meters. The heats for the 100-meter dash, however, fell on a Sunday. He refused to run on a Sunday, and his countryman ended up running instead and finished first. Liddell ran later, winning gold in the 400 which he had not really trained for. He was criticized by many of his countryman, called a traitor by some for putting his beliefs ahead of country, and pilloried by the media in Britain for not competing in his signature race (the 100). He did not get angry or fight back, but was resolute, believing his primary purpose was giving glory to God. Some would say running was giving glory to God and he actually believed that, too. Yet, serving God with his whole life came first, sharing his talents, but also giving his obedience to God as well.

## Being Intentional

We are asking for folks to make the call to worship, the ringing of the *angelus* five minutes before worship, our signal to settle down, become quiet, and allow the people around you to prepare themselves for worship. The musical prelude begins around that time, if not a few minutes later. At the service's conclusion, Blake plays a wonderful postlude which he takes time to prepare. We are asking that folks please take their conversations outside or – even better – down to coffee hour and allow the people who want to listen to the organ to do so without conversations going on around them. We never want to discourage our friendly chatter and greeting each other, the warm building of community and relationship, that happens when we see each other on Sundays. All that is being asked, really, is that we allow for some additional space for quiet, while still leaving room for talking and visiting.

## Handbell Choir

Playing handbells is an act of praise and the joy brought in the hearing connects us more closely to God and our faith. But there is special joy in the playing, and it is a musical joy accessible to almost everyone. One does not need "an ear for music" since the bell itself makes the tone, and so long as one does not ring it at the wrong time (which, frankly, can be quite humorous) you can't produce the wrong note. To play handbells one does not need to read music, although one learns the basics as one goes



along. More than anything, it is a lot of fun as the key to playing handbells is in coordination and tempo with little attention needed to the precise refinements that make choral and other instrumental music so marvelous. The handbells are from St. Mark's, and Blake has the idea to start out with a monthly rehearsal. That makes sense because, to maintain their special character, the handbells will only ever be played occasionally.

If interested, please give your name to Sue in the parish office who is keeping a list for Blake. One final thing I want to mention is that this parish ministry is a perfect activity even for young children. The ringer must be able to play when prompted. Most ringers handle two bells (well-experienced folks can do many more), but what joy it brings when a little one sounds their one bell—at the right time, of course. And then, of course, dads and/or moms can use the involvement of their child as their "excuse" to be a part of the choir!

Hearing assist support upgrade: We have an upgrade to our sanctuary audio system which should clear up volume issues some have experienced on the livestream and in the worship space itself. We have four devices which can be found on the table in the narthex (ask ushers for help, if needed). The process is simple and below; if you have an iPhone or Android, you can use your phone:

- + Get one of our hearing aid devices
- + Log into to St. James Par (our Wi-Fi network) with password StJofc2010
- + Go to the App Store and download Wavecast audio receiver (Williams).
- + Once you have the app, open it, and click on Search by channel or name
- + Adjust the volume on the hearing aid device (each device comes with simple instructions).
