Rector's Message

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us.

2 Corinthians 4:5 (NRSV)

Not too long ago I wrote of an amazing piece of music that arrested my attention and stirred deep spiritual grace and longing in me. Let me briefly repeat it, as it has become very important to me. The piece of music is called *The Corinthian Song* and it was written by Micah Stampley (and performed by him) in 2008, as a Gospel praise song, and has been covered by other Christian singers since then. The version that I came across was an arrangement by British singer/composer Sam Robson and it was stunning. The refrain, which is repeated over and over throughout, is "I'm a vessel full of power, with a treasure from the Lord."

What I didn't notice until now was that most versions of the text from 2 Corinthians 4:7, which inspires *The Corinthian Song*, remind us that "this treasure" is in "jars of clay" (see top of

the page). So, our bodies are temporary, and we are sinful, broken

vessels. Certainly, it is God's treasure that gives us power; God's treasure, not ours. What is the treasure that is the power that fills us, these "jars of clay"? Paul says, in 2 Corinthians 4:6, "God ... has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ." Then verse 7 begins, "But we have this treasure [the glory of God in Christ] in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us." We are imperfect vessels, in other words, filled with the overwhelming and

perfect power of God in Christ. We are vessels full of God's holy power, unrelenting and hopeful love in Christ, the creative Spirit that can drive us to accomplish amazing things through the power of God.

The world is on fire, or so we may think. We live in a hopeless age, where people are so often nasty to one another. Our planet, our culture(s) knows nothing but greedy, power-grabbing, egotripping maniacs who would use violence or any other means to get what they want. Well, every generation – let's look back at the 20th century – has had its tyrants, power hungry people who are willing to do anything to make things that do not belong to them theirs. We can so very easily succumb to fear, paralysis, anger, and name-calling, and completely forget that we are, in

Christ, vessels full of immense power that God has given us. We have the power of Christ in us, the light and energy of God's resurrected goodness. We are not powerless, nor should we be – ever! – hopeless or lost in the face of life's cruelty or a useless clawing for power, wealth, or recognition. "For God

has poured into our hearts the Holy Spirit, who has been freely given to us" (Romans 5:5). We are not huddled, tortured, helpless souls but vessels built by God, filled with God, and overflowing with hope and possibility. Christ has died for us and made us free from the tyranny of anger and sin. My hope, this program year, is that we can really hold onto, develop, discuss, and channel the reality that we have agency, a hope given to us, put into us, by God's power that is, in fact, God's power.

Warden's Corner

Dear Lovers of Christ:

You probably noticed the addition of the orchestral chimes from St. Mark's Church in New Britain now hanging in our sanctuary next to the lectern. Above that is the icon of St. Mark that Bishop Laura Ahrens gave to our merged parish. It is fitting, I think, that icons of St. Mark and St. James are now across from each other in our sanctuary. In order for St. Mark's Parish to be ready to merge with St. James we went through a process of loss, of giving up things that were very important to us. The same has been true of folks from Christ Church in Avon and for folks from Good Shepherd Parish in Bristol, where they went through a long merger process, and then many of them lost that, and are with us.

For those adept at the art of "positive spin," they can make the worst of things and situations seem wonderful. I have often thought that Christianity is the ultimate positive spin effort. If you don't know, biblical scholars tell us that the passion narratives were the earliest stories about Jesus that circulated in 1st century Palestine. Compelling narratives they are! But how does one derive a religion of faith, hope, and love out of stories of suffering and death?

As lemonade season comes to an end, it is good, I think, for us to consider what we are doing with all the lemons that come our way. Some people have a positive outlook dispositionally. That can be great, but it can also be irritating, as for many of us, making lemonade is not the first thing we think when faced with life's lemons. It requires careful thought and reorientation—as it did for the first generation of Christians. Seeing the negative and complaining comes naturally to many of us. It does to me. But as a boy, I vividly remember Father Winkler, the priest sent to our parish to build a new church. I mentioned something as a problem. He looked at me and said: "Stephen, there are no problems, only opportunities." That is how I try to live my life, not always successfully, but that is how I suggest we all approach our life together as the People of God. Lemonade is not just for summer.



The Rev. Canon Susanna Cates Mother Susanna received her Master of Divinity from the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest in 2013 and has served as an ordained priest in the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Northwest Texas, the

Diocese of Newark, and now in the Diocese of New Jersey. She's married to William and is a joyful "bonus parent" to her five stepchildren. Originally raised in the Jewish tradition,



she rejoices in the diversity, openness to questions, and welcoming spirit of the Episcopal Church – and she loves to hear about everyone's faith journeys!

Our retreat is centered around *The Corinthian Song* and its Scriptural source, 2 Corinthians 4:1–15. We may sometimes feel as though the bodily "jars of clay" that house our spirits are fragile, cast down, battered, and full of confusion. But God has created us, fills us with God's own Holy Spirit, and calls us to empty ourselves through the work of discipleship and service—and as we are emptied, we are continually refilled and strengthened! Join us as we pray, honor our own ministries, find new paths of service, and celebrate God's joyful power in each one of us.

Our time together begins Friday evening at 6 pm as we arrive at Camp Washington for dinner and our evening program. We'll continue our workshops and prayers on Saturday morning, welcoming those who are joining us just for the day, and conclude by 4 pm Saturday afternoon.

The weekend includes all meals, materials and supplies, and lodging for those arriving on Friday. The cost for the weekend is \$150.50 for a single room or \$200_for a double. Linda made a motion to accept the minutes. Ed seconded it. The motion passed unanimously.

Ministry Reports

Finance/Treasurer's Report – May 2025 - EJ Summary of EJ's Report

- Income is \$16,000 ahead of plan, driven by pledges and investments and early craft fair income
- Expenses are \$6,000 under budget, driven by our diocesan contribution being incorrect
- Overall, we are on track from both an income and expense standpoint.

Skip made a motion to accept the report. Linda seconded it. The motion passed unanimously.

Patio Update – Fr. George

Soil was removed this week. Materials are at Dunning. We are waiting for pricing on stair repair, which should be completed before the patio is laid.

DR Update - Fr. George

\$6,000 was raised through fundraisers. Leaving June 27th for eight days. The plan is to build 20 pews and participate in Vacation Bible School.

Accessibility Report

The report prepared by Stephen Hard based on a meeting with Molly, Zach Capitao (Molly's sonin-law who requires a wheelchair) and consultation with David Britt (who has been worshiping with us and also requires a wheelchair) was reviewed.

Stephen made a motion that the St. James Vestry establish an Accessibility Committee to investigate and make recommendations for improving the accessibility of our buildings and activities to those with impairments. Bob seconded it. The motion passed unanimously. Stephen will solicit members to participate. One idea under consideration is to alter the pews to provide half pews in locations other than the rear of the church.

Bob motioned to adjourn. Skip seconded it. Motion passed unanimously. Adjourned at 8:55 pm.

Beginning October 15th, each Wednesday at


11:30 am, there will be a brief service
