Rector's Message

... if thou dost not withstand, Christ's resurrection thine may be; Do not by hanging down break from the hand Which, as it riseth, raiseth thee.

– from George Herbert's *The Dawning*

We are on the very precipice of my favorite time of the liturgical year, as we surge through the powerful throes of Holy Week and Christ's Passion to the penultimate promise of the Christian life: Christ is risen! Sometimes, because we question and we doubt – which is holy and sacred because without ever questioning we would never discover – we struggle to embrace the real meaning and power behind the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The Resurrection of Jesus, in traditional orthodox icons, rarely depict Jesus as alone. He is typically presented as in hell, raising Lazarus or, more often than not, Jesus is stretching out and lifting up Adam and Eve. He is literally taking them by the hand, from their coffins, and bringing them up out of hell. Jesus' entry into hell - tradition calls it "The Harrowing of Hell" - in the time between His physical death and Bodily resurrection, goes toward the greatest power and point of Christ's rising to new life: He brings us with Him. Jesus does not leave us to our own devices, in our sin, brokenness, and pain; Christ, in offering His Body up to the powers of evil and death, overwhelmed death, and gave us a new life.


I began with a few lines of the great 17th century poet George Herbert's *The Dawning* partly because I love that last bit, "Do not by hanging

down break from the hand which, as it riseth, raiseth thee." Herbert reminds those who believe in the power of Jesus not to allow our "hanging down," our challenges and lack of purpose cause us to shrink from the One whose rising from death raises us all up to new life in Him. We sometimes miss the huge punch and earth-shattering implications of the Resurrection because we don't take it seriously enough. I encourage everyone to embrace Holy Week this year, as a remedy, to hold fast to the terrible lastness of Christ's Passion. When we sing "Go to dark Gethsemane," on Maundy Thursday as the altar is stripped, marking the bare, stark humiliation of Jesus and His agony on the Cross, remember His suffering and how much He gave for a sinful people. Observe Good Friday by understanding that Christ died and was buried. Easter is a promise that even in death, no matter our sin and shame, regardless of anything we

have done, as Christ rises, we rise. Jesus, in Resurrection, takes us by the hand and forcefully pulls us out of the pit. Easter is more powerful even than death.

How powerful is death? Anyone who has ever sat with someone as they die knows that there is

nothing more powerful, maybe not even the birth of a child, than someone taking their final breath. Resurrection means, after the final breath, there is a new birth. Easter is joyful because "I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor

anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8: 38-39). Christ's gravitational pull, in Resurrection, is the most powerful force ever, as it has all of creation – heaven and earth – behind it.

DR Mission Trip

We give thanks to the generosity of the members of St. James. Thus far, parishioners of St. James have given over \$7,200 through the envelope fundraiser and other gifts toward our work in the DR with our friends at De La Gracia in La Caleta, Boca Chica.



A little update for folks who aren't as familiar with our mission work in the Dominican Republic. St. James took our first Team to the DR in June of 2016. On April 10th, the team departs from Hartford on what will be our sixth mission to work with our friends in partnership with sharing, and receiving, the love of Jesus with our neighbors in the Caribbean. We have partnered with Redeemer, Sarasota, and St. John's, Tampa, to help the poor but loving community of La Caleta, in Boca Chica near Santo Domingo, to build a church. On Friday, April 17th, the parish church De La Gracia will be consecrated for worship and God's use by the bishop of the Dominican Republic.

While we are in the DR this year, we will host a short Bible School on Saturday, the 11th, a lunch and gathering for our friends at De La Gracia, after worship on the 12th, and complete building the furnishings for the worship space (altar, priest's chair, bishop's chair, bookcases for their Prayer Books, etc.) and lots of painting. Pray for our Team and the people of De La Gracia, as we are on the threshold of completing something they have dreamed of and worked for over the last 20 years.

Pastoral Care Ministry

The Pastoral Care group will meet at the church on Saturday, April 11th from 9–11 am. Grief is a journey. Grief is a universal emotion. The stages of grief, the cultural impact on grief, and strategies for supporting a grieving individual will be considered during the meeting. The session will be led by Stephen Ministers and parishioners Carol Merrill and Carolyn McGaughey. Join the group as they continue to consider, explore and develop pastoral care for our St James family. Refreshments will be provided.

Altar of Repose

On Maundy Thursday (April 2nd), following our 7 pm service and the Stripping of the Altar, our Lord lies in repose, in the Blessed Sacrament, in the Melissa Jane Inrig Memorial Chapel from the moment the service is over until the following morning at 7 am. We traditionally have sign up times, where people come in person and



sit an hour with Jesus during this time, memorializing the first night he spent in the tomb. All are invited to sign up for a time on the parish hall ramp bulletin board. Multiple people can sign up for any time slot, but it is the late night (2, 3, 4 am) slots that are more challenging to fill. Materials for prayer and reflection are available in the chapel, so that you may pass the Holy Hour faithfully. A brief, special time of prayer will be held in the Chapel at 7 am on Good Friday morning to conclude the Vigil.

Braver Angels visit

On Sunday, April 26th, after the 10:15 service, Paul Manfredi of *Braver Angels* will be with us. Paul is going to tell us a little bit about the work of *Braver Angels*, their mission, and how they work with communities like ours. *Braver Angels* has a vision: "We envision an America where courageous citizen is the honored norm, renewing civic culture and building trust across political difference." Though *Braver Angels* is a secular organization, a 501(c)(3), they have experience working with faith communities toward having constructive dialogue across difference. They encourage secular and faith-based communities to work together to create space for conversation when people disagree. We offer this opportunity as an exciting window into work we may invited into if we so choose. Join us and feel free to invite anyone you know from outside the church.

Outreach Corner

St. James Parish is pleased to again participate in the CT Foodshare Walk Against Hunger. This is the largest anti-hunger event of its kind in Connecticut. Foodshare works with over 400 donors to rescue surplus food. They then partner with a network of over 650 food pantries, meal programs, and mobile distribution sites throughout the state. CT Foodshare is a critically important organization dedicated to alleviating food insecurity in our state and desperately needs our support at this difficult time.



Our team is called “The St James Heelers”. We will walk the approximately 1.5-mile course as a team but are in the company of hundreds of fellow walkers. This event is fun and family-oriented, and everyone in our parish is invited and encouraged to join in the Walk! Please consider inviting family, friends, and coworkers to get involved by walking and/or donating. **Please note: all in person walkers need to register online.** Last year, we had a team of 24 walkers and raised a record-breaking \$2,395!! Of course, if you are unable to join us on the Walk day, you can still support us by donating online.

TO REGISTER TO WALK OR TO DONATE:

1. Go to www.ctfoodshare.org and click the arrow under “Walk Against Hunger”. You will be asked press either “Register” or “Donate now”.
2. To Register to walk, click “Register”. Next, click “Join a team” (you do **not** need to create a team). Search *St James Heelers* to join our team. You will be prompted to complete the registration. This is where you will be able to donate if you would like. If asked for an agency or team to receive our funds, we frequently select Farmington Food Pantry, Meals for Neighbors-Bristol, or Friendship Service Center, but you can indicate any participating agency of your choice.
3. To make a donation only (to support the team, but not walk, click “Donate Now”. In the space for crediting the fundraiser or team, type *St James Heelers* and click that into the box. You will be prompted to make your online donation.

Meeting on Social Concerns

On March 9th, over two dozen members of our parish family met to share concerns about what is happening in our country and the world. Father George led us in a meaningful and heartfelt discussion about the rising hatred we see, and how, as Christians, we feel called to respond.

A recent reading we heard in church said: “Once you were darkness, but now in the Lord, you are light.” (Ephesians 5:8) Our group discussion touched on how faith communities can be beacons of light in the current darkness.

We talked about scripture, which teaches us to love thy neighbor and to “invite in the stranger”. (Matthew 25:35) We touched on how the leaders of The Episcopal Church (led by our Presiding Bishop, Sean Rowe in the US) and our Connecticut diocese (ECCT) have joined in various messages to the public expressing concern that events “in communities across the country run counter to God’s vision of justice and peace.” (excerpt, A Joint Letter from 154 Episcopal Bishops: Whose Dignity Matters” 1-31-2026). What do the words of those bishops mean to each of us and to St. James as a faith community? We all are different people with different experiences and perspectives. Thus, one of the ideas shared was to provide more information, from an Episcopalian perspective, to our parishioners about what is going on in the world. So, periodically, information from the national church or the ECCT will appear in the weekly e-flash, the *Epistle*, or through other means our parish receives communication on important topics. We also plan to add links to The Episcopal Church’s and the ECCT’s various online publications to our website as resources for everyone to explore as they feel called to do.

We will continue to seek opportunities to spread Jesus’s message of love and to support that message with acts of love, especially for the most vulnerable in our midst.

If you have ideas on how to live out our faith in ways that meet “God’s vision of justice and peace,” please reach out to Father George or either of our wardens.

From time to time, the Prayer Team shares something of what they have found helpful, in the hope that you may find it helpful, too. This month, I went to our Hymnal, full of hymns familiar and some not so familiar. All are prayers and praises, set to music.

Here is Hymn #182, an Easter hymn: *Christ is alive!* It reminds us that we worship and serve a God who lives, and who reigns! And, when we pray, one who stretches out His arms and holds us to himself.

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing. His cross stands empty to the sky. Let streets and homes with praises ring. His love in death shall never die.

Christ is alive! No longer bound to distant years in Palestine, he comes to claim the here and now and conquer every place and time.

Not throned above, remotely high, untouched, unmoved by human pains, but daily, in the midst of life, our Savior with the Father reigns.

In every insult, rift, and war where color, scorn or wealth divide, he suffers still, yet loves the more, and lives, though ever crucified.

Christ is alive! His spirit burns through this and every future age, till all creation lives and learns his joy, his justice, love, and praise.

Summary Minutes of Vestry Meeting of February 19, 2026

Present: Fr. George Roberts, Kathy Bullard, Dave Hrdlicka, Carol Kirkwood, Linda Mason, Doug McDowell, EJ Ososki, Ed Preneta, Molly Sherman via Zoom, Bonnie Sudell, Michael Slusarz and Dave Tompkins.

Meeting called to Order: 7:02 pm.

Minutes of 1/15/26 Meeting

Linda made a motion to accept the minutes. Dave T. seconded it. The motion passed unanimously.

Ministry Reports

Finance/Treasurer's Report – January 2026 – EJ
Summary of EJ's Report

- Total income \$28,266 vs budgeted \$32,908 – not uncommon in January as larger pledgers give lump sums later in year and cold weather keeps parishioners home
 - Total expenses \$33,901 vs budgeted \$38,057 primarily due to a delay in some invoices
- Dave T made a motion to accept the report and Ed seconded it. The motion passed unanimously.

Wardens' words about expediting reports – Kathy and Dave T

- There was discussion about how to limit time spent on ministry reports. It was agreed that reports should only take a few minutes to present, and not all ministries need report each month. Calling the question can be invoked under Robert's Rules in case of lengthy discussion.
- The Vestry agreed to start future meetings at 6:30 vs 7:00.

Capital Committee

- Linda's minutes from capital committee meetings were sent to all.
- Our most pressing issue is our leaking roof. Our first claim was denied by our insurance company. We are working with another roofer.
- Structural and architectural drawings have been received for our lift. The project manager will be at the church Tuesday, after which we will start the bidding process.

- We will have a Town Hall Sunday, March 15th after the 10:15 service to let parishioners know what capital projects have been completed and what projects have been identified. We will also solicit input from members as to what projects they feel are important. There was consensus that the parishioners may not be aware of the problems that currently exist. We want to stress that we are building for the future.

DR Update – Fr. George

- The 8-person team will be in the DR from April 10th–18th. Possible projects include finishing the pews, building additional furnishings for the interior of the church, and painting, at the church or elementary school across from the Skilton Center.
- \$750 was raised from the Chili Cookoff.
- There are still envelopes on the kiosk to be taken and filled with cash.

Outreach – Kathy Bullard

- Church by the Pond was sparsely attended, due to the bitter cold, but excess lunches were sent to the Cathedral for distribution.
- The Walk Against Hunger will be April 25th.
- Money from the Craft Fair is now in the Outreach Budget. Some of the money may go to the Dominican Republic trip.

St. Mark's Ministries Quarterly Report/Overview – Dave Tompkins

Dave presented the detailed report. There was no discussion.

Women's Ministry – Linda Mason

Linda detailed the many activities, both past and future, including game night in January, coffee hours, baskets for the Prudence Crandall Center, Valentine's Day cards made by our children, compline and pot lunch March 8th, wine, cheese and poetry April 25th, breakfast on May 2nd, chocolate bingo on May 16th and "walking in creation" in Elizabeth Park on June 27th.

Old Business

Keyholders

Fr. George will put together a *rota* (rotation) for Vestry members to lock doors on Sundays. We will walk around the building Saturday during our retreat to familiarize all with the doors that need to be locked.

New Administrator and Possible Bookkeeper
The committee will meet February 24th at 11 am to discuss and put together a job description.

Social Concerns Committee

The first conversation will be February 23rd at 6:30 pm [*later re-scheduled to March 2nd due to snow*].

Safety Committee

The first meeting will be Monday, March 23rd at 6:30 pm. Possible topics include a safety plan, fire drills, CPR and AED training and exit signs, among others. There is no need to reinvent the wheel as there are safety committee templates made for churches.

New Business

Evangelism and growing the church

We have budgeted for a new position (\$20,000) for someone to work with our children and grow the church. Building on what is going well for us and what's exciting, we hope to channel what we have into the larger world, building and equipping disciples to grow in faith with energy and extend ourselves.

Dave T. motioned to adjourn. Dave H. seconded. Motion passed unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 9:07 pm.

Sunday Bible study

On Sunday, April 19th, we will begin a new Bible study on the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon, using a study guide by Stan Purdum, *Immersion Bible Studies: Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon*. The three books are connected as part of the "wisdom literature" of the Old Testament. Bible study begins Sundays at 12:30 pm via Zoom with Meeting ID: 815 4332 7235; Passcode: 982548.

Holy Week Schedule

Holy Week, which begins on March 29th with Palm Sunday, is the most important week of our liturgical year. Often called "Passion Week," the week following the Sunday of Palms should bring us to a fuller and deeper understanding and appreciation of how much God loves us and sacrificed for us. As Christians Holy Week accelerates our reflections on the Passion and death of Jesus, even as we prepare for Easter. We encourage you to participate in as many services as is possible for you and your family during the course of the week.



Sunday, March 29th, Palm Sunday/Passion Sunday – We are so very excited and blessed to be able to engage Palm Sunday in a more traditional way this year. At 8 am we will gather on the steps, weather permitting, for the Liturgy of the Palms. Our traditional Palm Sunday procession, weather permitting, will begin at 9:45 am at the corner of Mountain Rd and High St., in concert with our neighbors from First Church, Congregational. All are encouraged to participate but, if you have mobility issues, please feel free to wait for us in the church; we will arrive at the doors around 10 am.



Wednesday, April 1st at 7 p.m.
Tenebrae – Tenebrae literally means 'darkness' or 'shadows' in Latin. We present a series of wonderful readings as 7 candles are extinguished one at a time, until even the "Christ" candle is hidden, as if in the tomb. Tenebrae prepares us for the coming three days of Holy Week.



Thursday, April 2nd at 7 p.m., Maundy Thursday – Maundy is from the Latin *maunde, mande,* and *mandatum*, meaning "an order." On the night before Jesus died He said to His disciples, "a new commandment I give to you, that you love one another" (John 13:34). Anyone who wishes has the opportunity to keep vigil with Jesus for an hour overnight in the sanctuary where an Altar of Repose is set for the Blessed Sacrament.



Friday, April 3rd at 11:30 a.m. and 7 p.m., Good Friday – our mid-day service will be an intimate, contemplative service with short readings, Taizé music, and much time for reflection. At the 7 p.m. service we will observe the Veneration of the Cross, and taking of Holy Eucharist from the Reserved Sacrament, honoring Jesus as He lays dark in the tomb. For a fleeting moment, we feel outside the reach of Jesus, who is taken from us and placed into the ground, away from us. The low point of Holy Week, as Jesus dies on the Cross.



Saturday, April 4th at 7:30 p.m., The Great Easter Vigil – we celebrate Jesus' passing over from death to life, from darkness to light in a wonderful service called The Great Vigil of Easter, beginning at twilight.

Easter Sunday, April 5th at our usual times (8 and 10:15 a.m.) – Jesus is risen indeed! Joy abounds as we celebrate with uplifting music. We hope to have an Easter Egg Hunt for the children following the 10:15 am service.

God conquered death on Easter. Christ's rising from the tomb makes all the difference in the world because it trumpets the Good News that we matter, that we will always matter, that God is with us in life and in death. Easter is, then, a particularly appropriate time to remember loved ones who have died by giving flowers in their memory. 
